**Grammar** - The Infinitive of a verb "To do (something)" is not bound by time - it does not change its form when referring to past, present, or future. The time of the action is given by the rest of the sentence.

eg. "Yesterday I wanted to go to Portales"

"Today I want to go to Clovis"

"Tomorrow I will want to go to Elida"

The Greek **Present Infinitive Active** "To do (something)" is formed by adding  $-\varepsilon\iota\nu$  to the stem. If the verb stem ends in an  $-\alpha$ , contraction occurs, and the infinitive ending becomes  $-\alpha\nu$ .
